2.1. Mother and Child Health Center (MCHC)

- Mother and Child Health Care Center (MCHC) Established and it served for maternal and child health care including immunization, family planning, treatment of common diseases, ingress and minor surgery, services and sufficient knowledge for space of birth. Additionally, it provided the facility of basic lab to provide basic facilities of Urine test, blood C/E (including; ESR), Blood group test, blood cross match etc.
- LHVs were trained to provide the Family Planning Services and they provided services at the Mother and Child Health Care Center (MCHC) as well as in the field.
- Health Camps were arranged at 2nd and 7th month of the project duration. In these camps three specialist doctors including Child Gynecologist and ENT specialist from District Headquarter (DHQ) hospital District, Layyah were hired who examined patients and provided the necessary treatments.
- Health Education Seminars were arranged for the women in the project area. All the necessary arrangements of the seminar were organized by target local community.
- **Referral Services were provided** to serious patients that were unable to get treated and handled at MCHC. These patients were referred to District Headquarter (DHQ) hospital District, Layyah with provision of transportation facility as well as 50% less charges than normal.
- Health Camp arranged by ADO in Food affected areas in Punjab (Layyah, Rajanpur,DG Khan), Sindh (Hyderabad, Mirpur Khas and Thatta) and Balochistan (Barkhan, Loralai and Mosa Khel) in 2022 Flood disaster and provided the quality of health and hygiene session to beneficiaries.
- **Facilitated for Screening Camp on HIV AIDs** with the collaboration of Punjab AIDs control Program in different Union Councils in District Layyah.
- Arranged awareness session on TB with the support of TB DOT program in ADO Hall and community level.

Eye Camps

ADO identifies a large number of cataract patients through these eye camps. It is completely free for patients. We conduct eye camps with the cooperation of local administration and philanthropist. From these eye camps 2515 eye surgery patients were identified and later operated through our partner hospitals. ECP provided different services in the eye camps by expert eye doctors.

In first phase ADO started a construction of building for Primary school building and in 2nd phase ADO enrolled students. Till Date the said school achieved strength of almost **1000 students** and remarkable results for these students in District Layyah same on other end TLS the branch of ado has strengthen and provide job opportunities to **70 HHs** on permanent basis. ADO applied for funding aid to Embassy of Japan. This request for funding was approved by Embassy of Japan at 2005. ADO has been successively running a Middle level school named "The Learning School System (TLS)" in the target geography which is a sustainable execution of an initiative of Quality Education by Embassy of Japan. This project was reapplied for further funding request and extension in the Primary School Building up to a Middle Level, which was accepted by immediate effect from **15-02-2012**. These two projects were executed excellently by ADO and sustained since the mentioned period. At present a total number of **835** students (*including; 475 boys, 360 girls*) are acquiring quality education from Play Group to Middle level. The Learning school system was then funded for the studying in the two buildings comprising of approximately 57% enrolled children from local community.


